

## Message from our Board Chair and Executive Director

As we reflect on the past year, we are filled with gratitude and renewed momentum for the future of the Interlake Eastern Health Foundation (IEHF). Our commitment to advancing the health and well-being of our communities continues to grow, and this year's accomplishments reflect the power of working together for impact.

We are proud to share that this past year we increased contributions to our facilities and programs with a record \$524,731. These funds supported essential needs not covered elsewhere including specialized medical equipment, facility upgrades, staff training, and programs like Camp Stepping Stones—a healing space for children navigating grief.

Building on our strategic plan, Supporting Care and Community – The Path Forward, we continued to grow our reach and deepen relationships across the region. We proudly partnered with the Kinsmen KinKar Raffle and One Great Lottery opening a new stream of support through a province-wide collaboration. We also strengthened our internal systems and remained focused on delivering value to both our donors and the communities we serve.

In addition, we granted from our Endowment Funds for the first time and want to extend our gratitude to our endowment fund donors for their commitment to improving the health of our communities today, tomorrow, and forever.

This year is already off to an exciting start with the launch of a 50/50 Payday Payout raffle for staff of the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA). This initiative brings fun to the workplace and creates new opportunities to give back to local health care priorities.

Our work remains driven by community need and is made possible by community generosity. Whether it's through a monthly gift, a one-time donation, a grant, a legacy gift, or a raffle ticket, every action taken in support of IEHF helps ensure care is there—close to home—when it is needed most.

On behalf of the patients, families, and the communities we serve, thank you for putting your trust in the Interlake Eastern Health Foundation, we are honored to steward your donations and look forward to the continued impact we will make together.

#### **Equipment**

With your support, patients and staff benefit from items like specialty mattresses to improve comfort and reduce skin breakdown, transport chairs to make getting around facilities easier, reclining sleeper chairs to allow family members to stay at the side of their loved one. You also funded specialized equipment for occupational and physical therapy programs improving quality of life and getting patients back home more quickly.

#### **Programs:**



## The Power of Legacy

#### How One Man Turned Grief into a Gift That Will Never Stop Giving

After Robert (Bob) Turner lost his wife Cynthia, he knew he wanted to honour her memory in a meaningful way—something that would give back to the community they had both been part of and create a legacy that was true to her generous spirit and personality.

Grief can make decisions feel heavy. But one day, as Bob was sorting through some papers, he came across a brochure from the Interlake Eastern Health Foundation. It described the power of endowment funds and how a one-time gift could grow and support vital programs in perpetuity.

"Something clicked," he said. "I knew right away. This was the right thing to do."

With that, the Cynthia Turner Endowment Fund was born. Dedicated to supporting the palliative care program in Selkirk, the fund reflects Cynthia's kind nature and the profound impact the program had on their family.

"I had no idea about the palliative care program until we needed it," Bob shared. "The program made it possible for Cynthia to spend her final days the way she wanted: at home, with me by her side, and our children and grandchildren able to visit."

In addition to being a wonderful wife, Bob remembers Cynthia as a devoted and creative grandmother to their six grandchildren. "She loved to cook special meals for them when they visited and spent hours playing Barbies with our only granddaughter." he recalled. "She was a beautiful seamstress, she sewed outfits for the grandkids, knitted and crocheted, and made stuffed animals like bears and dinosaurs. She was our angel."

That deep love and care for others stayed with Bob, and when he created the fund, he directed that it support training and development for staff working in palliative care, because he saw firsthand the compassion, professionalism, and heart required to provide such care. In its first year of disbursing funds, the Cynthia Turner Endowment Fund supported training through Pallium Canada. This year, the fund will purchase new training mannequins and support staff through lunch-and-learn opportunities, ensuring that care teams can continue to strengthen their skills and confidence in a hands-on, collaborative environment.

"It is truly a privilege for our team to care for people at the end of life," says Tricia Tyerman, Director of the Palliative Care Program. "It takes a special kind of person, and providing opportunities for staff to receive continuing education and come together to practice skills and support each other makes a huge difference for our team."

Bob continues to contribute to the fund and is proud to see it grow each year. What began with an initial gift of \$15,000 has now grown to over \$32,000. His next goal: reaching the \$50,000 mark.

For Bob and his family, it brings comfort to know that Cynthia's name lives on—not just on the donor wall and electronic screen at Selkirk Regional Health Centre, but in the ongoing support the fund provides to the program that meant so much to them.

"I hope our story inspires others to do something similar," he said.

Endowment funds are powerful tools for remembrance and impact. The beauty of this kind of gift is its permanence: the principal remains invested, and only the interest is disbursed.

That means Cynthia's legacy will continue to support compassionate palliative care for generations to come.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the directors of Interlake-Eastern Health Foundation Inc.,

**Opinion** We have audited the financial statements of Interlake-Eastern Health Foundation Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2025, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Interlake-Eastern Health Foundation Inc. as at March 31, 2025, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

#### **Other Matter**

The financial statements of the company for the year ended March 31, 2024, were audited by another auditor who expressed an unmodified opinion on those statements on September 13, 2024.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.



As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. ☐ Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management. #### 1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

Interlake-Eastern Health Foundation Inc. is a registered charity incorporated without share capital under the laws of Manitoba and is exempt from income tax under Section 149 of the Income Tax Act (Canada).

The organization was established to benefit the citizens of Interlake-Eastern health region by supporting health care needs in the region.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The financial statements of the organization have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Financial instruments Financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at fair value.

Subsequent measurement

of financial assets and liabilities are at amortized cost unless otherwise noted. Financial assets and liabilities measured at amortized cost consist of cash, accounts receivable, and accounts payable.

It is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant credit, currency, interest rate, liquidity or market risks arising from these financial instruments, unless otherwise noted.

The organization is exposed to the following significant risks:

Market and interest rate risk Market risk is the risk that the value of an investment will

fluctuate as a result of

changes in market prices, whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual investment or factors affecting all securities traded in the market. Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The organization is exposed to market risk and follows its investment policy statements to monitor the investments in an effort to safeguard against market fluctuations. The organization is not exposed to significant interest rate risk as cash and bank are held in short-term products, and investments are diversified.

Notes to the FinancialStatements For the year ended March 31, 2025

Liquidity risk Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations

associated with financial liabilities. The organization is exposed to liquidity risk as it is dependent on receipt of funds from operations.

#### Investments

The organization uses the fair value method to record investments traded on an active market. Unrealized gains and losses are reported in income.

**Revenue recognition** The organization follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate restricted fund when received or receivable. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the Unrestricted Fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Contributions from the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA) are recognized as revenue when specific ancillary revenue is earned by IERHA if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Interest revenue and investment income are recognized as revenue in the period earned.

Other revenue is recognized as revenue in the period received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

**Fund Accounting** The Unrestricted Fund relates to the organizations's program delivery and administrative

activities. No restrictions have been imposed by the donors or Board of Directors on these funds. These funds are managed in accordance with general Board policies and may be restricted only through Board of Directors motion.

Endowment Funds represent contributions to be maintained in perpetuity and are comprised of funds subject to varying degrees of restriction on the use of capital and income. Unless specified by the donor, investment income earned on the Endowment Fund is reinvested in the Endowment Fund.

Externally Restricted Funds represent contributions restricted by donors for the highest priority needs and for areas of interest. Board policy states that these funds must be spent within twenty-four months of receipt.

Notes to the FinancialStatements For the year ended March 31, 2025

**Contributed services** A substantial number of volunteers contribute a significant amount of their time each year.

Due to the difficulty of determining the fair market value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Contributed materials which are used in the normal course of the organization's operations and would otherwise have been purchased are recorded at their fair value at the date of contribution if fair value can be reasonably estimated.

**Use of estimates** The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting

standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements, as well as reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. These estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty, and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

#### **6. DEFERRED CONTRIBUTIONS**

The Pine Falls Health Auxiliary raised funds in the amount of \$3,182 in prior years for the purchase of waiting room furniture for the Pine Falls Health Centre with surplus funds remaining at the conclusion of the project. These funds have been restricted by the Board of Directors for cable and internet charges for the facility waiting room. No funds have been spent in the current year.
